BATTLE OF ATLANTIC 50TH ANNIVERSARY

For Monday, July 5, we have organized a trip to beautiful Chester, Nova Scotia. After lunch, RADM Debby Piers will speak to us about the naval history and associations of Chester, which has been his special area of research since retirement. Should be a great day in a beautiful part of the world.

HISTORY LESSON

"They will be known as UNIVERSITY NAVAL TRAINING DIVISIONS of the university to which attached, short title UNTD."
 (Naval Order 2854 - 19 June 1943)

The idea of a UNTD stems from a chance meeting in Jamaica in the winter of 1938, between Professor A.W. Baker of the Ontario Agricultural College and CDR E. Reginald Brock, CO of the Montreal Division of the RCNVR. When war broke out, CDR Brock was appointed Director of Reserve Divisions, with the rank of Captain.

In August 1942, CAPT Brock and Professor Baker called on the President of OAC and persuaded him to permit the establishment of an unofficial scheme to provide naval training on a similar basis to the COTC and the RCAF equivalent. In January 1943, the Naval Secretary authorized CAPT Brock to offer Professor Baker a commission and charged him "to form Naval Training Units in Universities where there are RCNVR Divisions".

UNTD units were established in 16 universities. Officer-candidates trained evenings and university vacations, appeared before selection boards and were commissioned. Unfortunately, naval statistics do not differentiate between direct-entry officer candidates and UNTD candidates, so no accurate number of UNTD members exists for the 1943 - 1945 period.

In 1946, Professor Baker returned to OAC and CDR (SB) C. Herbert Little RCN(R) was appointed Staff Officer UNTDs. CDR Little thus became responsible for organizing the peacetime UNTD of which we are the main beneficiaries. 1993 marks the 50th Anniversary of the founding of the UNTD.
