

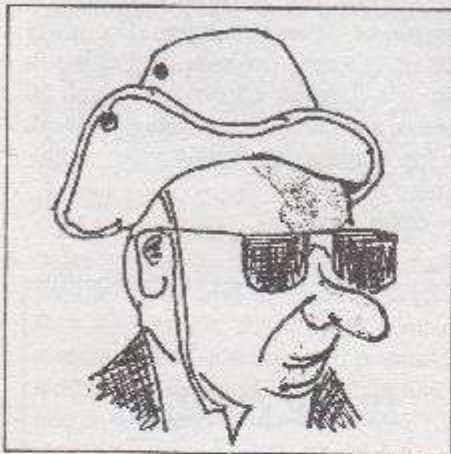

It was like being back in residence but much better - no classes, no exams, a wonderful congenial group who all found an astonishing amount in common. And, of course, there were no women in residence back in those prehistoric times. We enjoyed every event twice over because every night we lived them over again through each other's eyes and then drank coffee, rum or whatever while we sat into the night (usually 0100 or 0200) reminiscing about UNTD days - Halifax then, Esquimalt then, cruises and adventures, mishaps and just like every common room, then and now, life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

Our residence included Bob and Eileen Williamson, Bob Judd, Briann Gibson, "Herbie" Little, Ed and Donna Pipe, Andy Shaw, Bob Duncombe, Harry Ross and John Dead-

The UNTD did produce a surprisingly large percentage of doctors, lawyers and other successful professional and business people. LET US PRAY

On Sunday morning July 4th, as a part of the UNTD Reunion, over 100 of those at the Reunion attended a unique Chapel Service in the Chapel of King's College. The first unique feature was the number there. In 1985, on the occasion of the 75th Anniversary of the RCN, a joint UNTD/HMCS "KINGS" Reunion Chapel Service was held on the Sunday morning under identical circumstances. The total attendance at the reunions was well over 400. Approximately 75 souls attended the church service. This time with a total attendance of about 250 of whom slightly over 200 were in full time attendance at our Reunion, we more than filled the Chapel. Secondly, it was a truly unique ecumenical service presided over by ex-UNTD's Bill Thomas (Anglican), Vince Ihaz (United Church) and Jim McEntee (Roman Catholic). Bill is a member of the UNTD Association of Upper Canada and organized the Service. Vince was, for many years, Chaplain (P) of HMCS "SCOTIAN", the Naval Reserve Division in Halifax, and now has a church in Lunenburg. Jim is a Parish Priest in Montreal. The Church community at large should take a lesson from their

effortless, seamless cooperation - but then, "Sailors, with their built-in sense of order and discipline should really be running the world".

Bill's sermon stressing the camaraderie of the UNTD and the fellowship of the sea, and the traditional Naval Prayer and hymns culminating in "Eternal Father Strong to Save" left few dry eyes even among those of us who go to Church once a year (on Battle of Atlantic Sunday). For many of us, it seemed to sum up our youth in the UNTD between 25 and 50 years ago and all the years between with a sense of having done something right.

MORE GILBITS

UP SPIRITS

Fittingly, the Chapel Service was followed by "Up Spirits" in the former Wardroom of HMCS "KINGS", now the Junior Common Room of King's College. The College was HMCS "KINGS", the RCNVR officers training establishment in World War II. King's College has a marvellous sense of tradition and it still says "Wardroom" on the door. The room was restored as closely as possible to its wartime configuration in 1985.

Gil Hutton officiated in serving the tots from the oak rum tub and original brass tot measure from HMCS "SACKVILLE". Even the rum was almost authentic - 100 proof London Dock rum. (Pusser's rum from 1685 to 1970 was a mixture of any three of five prescribed West Indian rums. It was 95.5 proof). As mentioned before, everybody had a tot, and some more, to the last drop.

SECOND NAVAL HISTORICAL CONFERENCE IN QUEST OF A CANADIAN NAVAL IDENTITY

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It's only a few brief months ago that we received a package from MARCOM calling for papers, a call that was published in this Newsletter. In the topics offered, there was one that caught our eye: "The Reserves, the University Naval Training Divisions (UNTD) and Canadian Society. Indispensable naval links to Canadian Society or a cosy club."

What with the preparations for the Reunion and the UNTD's known preference for camaraderie, there was little reaction to the call for papers that we knew about.

But wait! One of our number did indeed rise to the bait. In early October our Association Historian, Bob Williamson, stood up in front of a room full of admirals and presented a stirring defense of the UNTD and a grand defiance to its detractors (in-

cluding Paul Hellyer), with the title "THE UNTD AND CANADIAN SOCIETY".

To give you a feeling of Bob's work, we quote briefly from the summary.

"The navy has never fully appreciated the inherent value of having a large number of well-placed, highly educated citizen sailors"

"If investment in people is an important value, then serious consideration should be given to returning to the concept of the UNTD program as it existed prior to 1968."

And finally, "It is my belief that the UNTD is a quintessential product of the Canadian system, steeped in Royal Navy tradition but tempered by social and democratic conditions that are uniquely Canadian. If you are looking for a Canadian Naval Identity, you will find it here in the

UNTD".

Bob's paper was well-received by the assembled admirals, many of whom (VADM Anderson included), were ex-UNTD's.

We believe that Bob has made a very valuable contribution to naval thinking in this paper. In due course, it will appear in book form with the other papers given at this conference.
