WEST COAST REUNION

The West Coast Reunion has just come to an end as this text is being prepared and the more adventuresome attendees are enjoying a cruise to Alaska. However, as a member of the planning committee, your editor has gathered a few notes on the work that went into pulling off this extraordinary event and the feedback from some early returnees.

First indications are that the 150+ former cadets and their wives who attended had a wonderful time. Credit must be given to the entire committee for the successful planning of this operation with special recognition to Gil Hutton, Jack Kilgour, Rev. Bill Thomas and Doug Hain. You can be sure that organizing a reunion at a site over two thousand miles away is a most difficult and costly undertaking.

That difficulty was not appreciated by a few former UNTiDies who complained that many of the several thousand former cadets like themselves did not get invitations to the reunion. They, like a few other out-of-touch individuals seemed to be of the opinion that someone has kept an updated roster of cadets for the last 57 years. Some people seem to have forgotten that Defense Minister Hellyer disbanded the UNTD, along with many other aspects of the Canadian Armed Forces and their records in 1968. Nor have some people given much thought as to where the several thousand dollars would come from to pay for a comprehensive mailing, if such a thing were possible. Our committee did in fact send out close to 1,000 invitations to individuals who have maintained some interest in the UNTD over the years. We could only hope that word of mouth would help to further publicize the reunion as it did for these complainers. Too bad they declined to attend.

A few years ago, Bob Morris heard about the UNTD Association by word of mouth and happily did attend the reunion with his wife, Laura. They had a great time, combining their trip with a family reunion. Bob and Laura were both pleased with their registration gift of a book by Latham B. Jenson, "Tin Hats, Oilskins & Seaboats". They also found their accommodations at Royal Roads, very comfortable. The Meet & Greet, held in the setting of the old castle wardroom overlooking the Straits of Juan de Fuca was an impressive

way to begin the reunion. All went well until a few individuals wandered off on an impromptu tour and set off the building security alarm.

Bob was particularly impressed with the Friday tour of HMC Dockyard and the new frigate, HMCS Vancouver. Being an engineer, he found the tour of the ship to be a fantastic experience and was filled with pride in the Canadian engineering that he witnessed. The smorgasbord sandwich lunch that was prepared by the ship's cooks on the helicopter deck was nothing to be sneezed at either.

When the Sooke Logger's Show and Salmon Feast fell through, the organizing committee debated over a replacement program. As it turned out, the Cowichan Native Village Coast Salish Feast was a superior evening. Everyone came away from that event with the impression that the Coast Salish Natives must have gone into decline from overeating.

The Saturday tour of Victoria and Butchart Gardens was conducted under excellent weather. As good as these attractions are, the highlight had to be the hot buffet lunch at the fabulous, new wardroom at Naden overlooking the Straits and Olympic Mountains of Washington State.

The mess dinner held on the quarterdeck in Grant Block at Royal Roads, was the best attended event of the reunion. The West Coast UNTiDies turned out in full force. RADM. Buck, Maritime Commander Pacific, was the guest of honor and Peter C. Newman, the guest speaker. It was a grand affair, although Gil Hutton had his moments of frustration in trying to get the civilian caterer to understand the requirements of naval tradition.

Rev Bill Thomas, using the old RCN Naval Prayer Book conducted a very moving Church Service on Sunday. It brought back a lot of memories, as did the Up-Spirits and Branch that followed. The brunch caused a few UNTiDies to relive their experiences at fire fighting school when an alcohol lamp under a hot tray exploded, setting off the fire alarm. The building was evacuated until the fire department gave the all clear.

In summing up the reunion, what was the bottom line for Bob Morris? He would not have missed it for the world, and it would not have happened without guys like Gil Hutton & Co. *Editor*

IN MEMORIAM

Donald Kenneth Alan GILLIES

Jan. 17, 1924 – Mar. 14, 2000

UNTD HMCS Prevost (U.W.O) 1946-49

The Spring Edition of this newsletter, containing the last installment of Don's Diary, was being mailed to our membership when your editor received the sad news that Don had passed away. He died of complications brought on by a bad case of the flu, bronchitis and asthma. How unfortunate that Don did not get to see the final part of his diary in print. His wife, Jeanne, said that he had gained great pleasure in having his story featured in our newsletter. He was both honored and flattered by the popular response that his historical record of the polio cruise had engendered in our readers. It is therefore fitting that we include a brief tribute to his memory.

Don was born in humble surroundings near Emo in northwestern Ontario, 76 years ago. After graduating from high school, he taught in a one-room schoolhouse, until he accidentally burned it down. He managed to enroll in a science program at the University of Western Ontario after receiving a scholarship from a successful businessman who made a fortune in the lumber industry. He joined the UNTD in 1946 and graduated with a BSc. in 1949. After completing his MA in Atmospheric Physics at the U. of T. in 1950, he married Jeanne de Jausserand whom he described as his lover, friend, homemaker and arguing companion. They raised three boys, Doug (California), Bruce (Vancouver) and Grant (Edmonton). Don joined the Ontario Hydro's Research Division in 1953 and retired as Manager of Environmental Protection in 1987. His work in meteorology and hydrography was exciting and creative. It involved research in winds on the Great Lakes, water levels and ice jams. Don and Jeanne lived in Etobicoke until retiring to the rural life near Beeton, Ontario. There, they enjoyed curling, lawn bowling, golf and horticulture for nearly 13 years. Then, looking for a gentler climate and closer proximity to their children and grandchildren, Don and Jeanne moved to Parksville on Vancouver Island two years ago.

In his funeral plans, Don's naval experience and love of the sea was reflected in his final request. After cremation, he asked that his ashes be scattered from the ferry between Nanaimo and Horseshoe Bay. He also wanted "Amazing

Grace" played at his memorial service. The latter was accomplished with great feeling, but the former could not be arranged and he is interred at St. Anne's Cemetery, Parksville.

Don's son, Bruce, remembered in his eulogy that his father's great passion was major league baseball. Starting as a boy in Emo, Ontario, he listened to games on the radio. His life-long dream came true when he was able to attend an All-Star game and the World Series in Toronto.

Life-long friend, Parker Alford, remembered in his eulogy that he and Don met 55 years ago when they registered as science students at U.W.O. Their friendship expanded when they joined the UNTD and were shipped off to Esquimalt to learn how to march, scrub decks and chip paint. They also learned that British Columbia was a beautiful part of the world and a great place to live, even though it would take the better part of a lifetime before they moved there. Parker felt that living together in the men's mess of a naval ship was a great way to learn about people and it was there that it became clear that Don was an unusually cheerful, kind, patient and unpretentious person. He enriched the lives of all those he met. For that reason, Parker gave Don a diary to keep a record of his UNTD experiences. It was that diary in which he recorded the 1948 dream cruise in HMCS Athabaskan.

By sharing the recorded thoughts from his diary, Don has helped to rekindle the happy memories of our past experiences.
