I welcome this opportunity to provide you with a quick overview of your Board's activities.

The Board met on Tuesday December 14th and considered some key matters concerning the future of the UNTDA.

Incorporation

Further to our earlier decision to incorporate the UNTDA, the Board approved our initial By-laws and will commence the development of Board policies. The Incorporation process has been managed by Robert Blakely from his base in Edmonton and has required a considerable sacrifice of time.

Incorporation materials will be available online and the by-laws will be presented to the membership at the next general meeting for ratification.

UNTDA 2025

We received a report prepared by Board member, Marta Mulkins which provides a recommended road map for the future of our organization. It is very comprehensive and provides a number of suggestions to position the UNTDA to be more

UNTDA 2025

Nous avons reçu un rapport préparé par la membre du conseil d'administration, Marta Mulkins, qui fournit une feuille de route recommandée pour l'avenir de notre organisation. Il est très complet et fournit un certain nombre de suggestions pour positionner responsive to the changing expectations of our membership. The report has been sent to the Executive Committee to establish both short-term and long-term priorities for realizing the key recommendations.

Both the By-laws and the Mulkins Report will be posted on the website and your comments and suggestions are very welcome, as they will be of considerable assistance in our decision-making.

2023

The other major matter of discussion was the planning for the UNTDA Convention in 2023 taking place in Victoria May 9-12, 2023. The planning committee is chaired by Roger Elmes and will feature a number of tours, discussion panels and a mess dinner. Roger also has representatives in many cities who are tracking Naval Reserve Centennial plans by the Naval Reserve Divisions.

This will be a very interesting and rewarding conference in its own right but additionally and significantly it will mark a major turning point in the history of the UNTDA. The conference will include the General Meeting of the UNTDA which will feature exciting proposals for the future of the Association which will be substantially influenced by the recommendations contained in the Mulkins Report. I hope as many members as possible will attend and be on the ground floor in directing our future course.

2023

A Mid-Life Crisis

After reading Paul Seguna's item on his training time aboard Oriole in the last issue of Gunroom Shots I recalled my own brief involvement with that vessel's history.

In the Fall of 1973 after a few months' employment with the Naval Reserve, I extended my "training" to the end of December in the role of Staff Officer Reserves on the staff of the Commander Training Group Pacific (Captain R.D. Okros).

One of my ancillary duties that Fall was to be nominally in charge of HMCS Oriole. There was no training or sailing program and I was aboard only a few times for specific minor tasks. The most significant reason for going aboard Oriole that Fall was to observe the condition of the ship's steel frames which the Captain had learned were compromised. I was to provide him with a verbal report.

I was surprised to observe that one of the hull's main frames was badly corroded to the extent that, as I recall, half the steel in the I Beam approximately mid-ships and perhaps five feet in length was no longer there.

My report was not intended to be definitive and really only a viewpoint from another pair of eyes for the Boss. However, he did ask me if I thought the ship should be saved, repaired and used for further training. I gave him my opinion and he seemed to agree.

My final task aboard Oriole was to remove all the remaining liquor to a designated storage bunker in Colwood after she had been moved into the drydock for repairs and maintenance. Clearly the offending frame was successfully replaced along with lesser repairs as Oriole subsequently, along with a sail training program, participated in several annual Swiftsure and

Victoria to Maui races ... in fact she won the latter in 1979 or 80.

Ed: Al, thanks for sharing this unique perspective and reminding me of our personal connection. These are just the sort of stories we encourage our readers to send in! In 1967 you were a 2nd year UNTD in Esquimalt and I was one of the Term Lieutenants. Fun days!

TIDBITS

101 and Still "Sailing"

At 101 we salute a VERY old friend who many call a "national treasure." Commander (ret'd) Peter Goodwin Chance at 101 years of age is probably the oldest of our Naval Reserve cadré and ever the eternal optimist. He joined the naval reserve in the late 1930s as a midshipman. He has remained active and very interested in Maritime Affairs and the RCN, enthusiastically sharing thoughts, advice and opinions.

Already in the naval reserve when hostilities broke out in 1939, Peter joined the destroyer HMCS St Laurent as a midshipman four days after Canada entered the war, then sailed off with a convoy the next day. That was the beginning of his 30-year naval career. He spent the war in a succession of RCN and Royal Navy ships, including HMCS Skeena, which in 1944 was lost along with 15 of its crew after running aground during a wild storm off Reykjavik, Iceland. Peter was the navigator on board. The ship dragged her anchor and went up on the rocks. He had warned the Captain that anchoring was too dangerous as the storm was a hurricane. He was right. The ship was written off. Those lost were buried in Iceland. His wife Peggy died in 1996. Peter still lives independently and happily in Sidney, BC. May he continue to enjoy fair winds and following seas.

Naval Centenarian

Nick Slonosky reminds us It's not every day that someone turns 100. Gord Saunders celebrated his 100th Birthday in Winnipeg this last November 22nd and was duly recognized by the local chapter of the NAC. Gord was in the wartime RCNR and also served at Chippawa post-war (retiring as a LCdr), and was well known to many. Gord may be the last living member of the original Chippawa when the division was commissioned in 1941.

Gord Saunders is Dave Saunder's father. Dave is UNTD '65 and is originally from Chippawa but finished his Reserve service at Carlton in Ottawa.

Reverend LCdr (ret'd) Bob MacLean, CD recently sent a nice note into Gunroom Shots with a short reminiscence of his early days in the Army and Navy Cadets from 1947 onwards, his entry to the UNTDs at HMCS Star in 1964, and subsequent experience in a number of HMC Ships, including the "O Boats." Bob became Padre' MacLean, Chaplain Emeritus serving as Chaplain to the Third Destroyer Squadron, the Fifth and Second Squadrons. Bob was also a former Halifax Dockyard Senior Chaplain.

Robert MacNeil

I've seen a lot of articles and interviews by and about Robert MacNeil and one very salient point not mentioned in your Tidbit, is that prior to the UNTD, Robert had applied to the "naval college", which I take to be Royal Roads, and he failed the "entrance exam". Given his age it was probably in 1948/9 and that surely was a huge disappointment to the father. Why he failed that is hard to say, possibly during the interview phase, particularly if he wasn't interested. So going in to Dal and the UNTD was somewhat a redemption? Voluntarily terminating that would have been a second and final blow for his father. His father:

Robert Auburn Stewart MacNeiL was a swashbuckling RCNR WWII Officer with a number of significant Commands and events under his belt, and his story is awesome in its own right.

Two elements of his story are grabbing: First, at the outbreak of WWII he was in the RCMP Marine Division (as well as in the NavRes) and was Skipper of RCMPV LAURIER. LAURIER was taken over by the RCN and became HMCS LAURIER and MacNeiL became her CO as a LT RCNR. Second, when he became CO of the Corvette DAUPHIN, the gunshield art pictured a Mountie in full dress uniform, pistol in hand, riding a U-boat in the water as if it was a horse. That Gunshield Art is currently at the Crowsnest in St John's and was hanging in the main room when we were there in 2018.

His next younger son:

Hugh Malcolm David MacNEIL, fulfilled the father's "dreams" in spades. He entered CMR I think the year it opened and had a sterling RCN career, retiring as a VADM.

The father died in 1959, at the very young age of 53, and so did not get to witness the careers of either son. His youngest son:

Michael Warren MacNeil was the 3rd and youngest son who had no naval or celebrity career and died last year.

ORIOLE at 100. Very impressive! A WWI war prize if I recall correctly(?)

Ed: Steve, ORIOLE was built and owned by Canadians. It was the naval sailing vessel PICKLE that was a WWII German war prize. (See piece below).

I remember our first Astronaut Captain(RCN)Marc Garneau recounting his trans-Atlantic ventures in PICKLE as a young naval officer under training. He likened it to the same fear and excitement of the unknown he later felt in Space.

CNAV PICKLE

The Helgoland was a yawl designed and built in Germany in 1936. With the onset of WWII, she was transferred to the Kreigsmarine as a school ship. After the war the Royal Navy took over Helgoland as a war prize and renamed her PICKLE to honour the sailing vessel that brought back the news of Nelson's victory at Trafalgar. In 1953 the PICKLE was gifted to the RCN by the RN. Based in Halifax the PICKLE, similarly with ORIOLE on the West Coast, was used to teach future navy officers to navigate, make contact with the sea, acquire the art of sailing and promote the Canadian flag. Being too costly to maintain PICKLE was finally sold to a private Canadian buyer in the early '70s.

David Grant Frayer, Q.C. (died 8 Nov '21) Chippawa '60

Dave's roster of professional achievements was shaped by his extraordinary career as a litigator, including a 20-year tenure as Director of the Winnipeg Regional Office, Department of Justice Canada. Masterful in the courtroom, Dave was also a mentor to lawyers who fondly called him, 'The Chief'. He had two Queen's Council designations - a rare achievement - as well as numerous awards and citations, including the Royal Military Institute of Manitoba's Twice the Citizen Award for his military and legal career.

From a young cadet in 1960, Dave went on to serve in the Navy's JAG Reserve Branch as a military judge, retiring in 1996 with the rank of Commander. Above all his achievements we'll remember Dave for his high spirit and uplifting humour...RIP.

DEREK BROWN B.Comm, JD, LL.D (died 9 Nov '21)

Scotian '62

Derek was the son of a decorated World War II veteran, George Brown and his mother Eileen, also a proud Royal Canadian Navy veteran. He attended Rothesay Collegiate School and later Dalhousie University where he excelled in all his areas of academics and athletics. His contributions to Dalhousie were ultimately recognized with an Honorary Doctor of Laws in 2006. While at school he was an enthusiastic participant in the Royal Canadian Navy Reserve and he remained a steadfast supporter of our armed forces his entire life.

He always said, 'You better be nice to people on the way up because you are going to meet them again on the way down' which pretty neatly encapsulated his approach to life and people.

Peter Chipman (died 26 Sep '21)

Our minstrel ("Oh Merry are We") Peter Chipman sadly left us in Victoria last Fall. Art Kuiper recounted that he lived in the same community as Pat & Peter, although their paths did not cross often.
